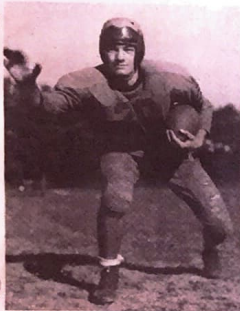

The tradition was born in 1945 with a win. Jim Lippincott's 31-yard touchdown pass to Robert Welder gave the Wilson Presidents

(the school's nickname before it changed to the Bulldogs in 1960) a 7-0 victory against Reading High School's JV squad at George Field.

The starting lineup for that first game, coached by Warren Eberly, included: ends, Carl Richards and Arthur Stahnau; tackles, Richard Ruth and Norman Sensing; guards, Richard Balhauer and Willard Conrad; center, Gerald Reed; quarterback, Robert Natzinger; halfbacks, Herbert Welder and David Ulrich; and fullback, James Lippincott.

The Presidents, with 54 players, wouldn't win again in that inaugural year but it was a start.

The football program was established through the combined efforts of the Wilson School District Board of Education and the newly formed Wilson Boosters Club. The Boosters Club, headed by Lippincott's father, Joseph, was formed to lend moral and financial assistance to the athletic department. The boosters were able to raise \$2,200 for the program while the athletic department kicked in another \$4,000.

Ralph Leininger, Wilson High Athletic Director, was in charge of purchasing the equipment. Since the United States was still in World War II, there was very little equipment available. He negotiated a deal with a semi-pro football team, the Gableville Owls, for uniforms.

All games were played on the road during that first season. The team practiced on a cow pasture.

After the opening win, Wilson traveled to Manheim Township, Wyoming, Copley and Muhlenberg and was outscored a combined 92-19. Eberly left after only one year but continued to stay active in Berks County athletics as an official.

In 1946, Robert Thompson led Wilson to a 4-3-1 record and the first of many winning seasons. The first home win in school history was a 25-6 win over Copley.

Wilson went a combined 2-16 in 1947 and 1948. Individuals who stood out during those two years were Thomas O'Neil and Leon Moyer. O'Neil returned a kickoff 84 yards for a

touchdown in 1947, while Moyer set a school record in 1948 when he intercepted a pass and raced 97 yards for a touchdown - his record would stand until 1971. In 1949, the Presidents closed out the decade with a 3-5-1 record. Richard DiGuardi threw seven touchdown passes and finished his career with 1,204 passing yards and 16 touchdowns. Eighty of those yards came in 1948 when he hit Ronald Schlabach for a touchdown against Manheim Central.

The big win of the 1949 season was a 21-19 upset of cross-town rival Shillington (now Governor Mifflin). Peter Iaccarino kicked an 18-yard field goal in the last 20 seconds for the win. Iaccarino is the only President player to kick two career field goals.

The President's finished the 1949s with a combined 10-28-2 record. The team's leading scorer was O'Neil with 67 points.

50 years of Wilson Football History

The 1950 season marked the beginning of a new decade and Wilson's first Berks County football championship. The team finished 4-5 overall but had key wins over Berks County rivals Shillington, West Reading and Boyertown. The 10 loss in Berks County was to Muhlenberg, 7-6.

During his five seasons, Thompson went 13-29-2 with one championship.

Robert Shaak took over the Presidents in 1951 and finished 1-9 during his inaugural year. The highlight of the season was a 51-7 rout of Manheim Central. The Presidents went 4-5-1 the following season.

Robert Mittel provided most of the offense for the Presidents during the early 1950s as he had five scoring plays of 70 yards or more.

Shaak had his first winning season in 1953 when the Presidents finished 4-3-1. Retired

four-star United States General Frederick Franks led the Presidents in scoring and finished his career with 10 touchdowns.

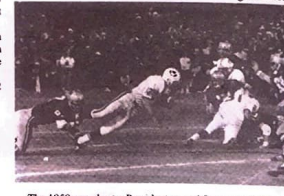
In 1954, the Wilson School District grew through a merger with Sinking Spring High School. Bill Schurfer was the first student from Sinking Spring to play for the Presidents. The Presidents finished the season 2-8. The big win was a 27-0 win over Governor Mifflin - a feat that wouldn't happen again until 1967. In 1955, the Presidents slipped to 2-6-1.

The Presidents were on the winning track again in 1956 when the club finished 6-3. The only night game at old Wilson Stadium was a 25-20 win over Warwick. The top receiver from the team was Charles Buzzanca who caught 25 passes for 441 yards. The Presidents went 5-2-1 in 1957 led by two-time All-Berks center, Gary Leach, and the Presidents career rushing and scoring leader, Carl Boidler. The Presidents went 5-3 in 1958, but the best President team ever came along in 1959.

Under the leadership of Shaak and the passing

of Andy Straka, the Presidents finished 8-1-1. The only blemish was a tough tie to Lebanon Catholic and a loss to Governor Mifflin.

The 1959 squad set a President record for most points scored in a season with 233 and most rushing yards with 2,266.

On defense, the Presidents registered six shutouts and only gave up 52 points all season. Kit Fegley finished his career with 160 tackles and was a two-time All-Berks selection.

During the first 15 years, the program produced six winning seasons and one championship. A new nickname and a new era was on the horizon for the Wilson football program.

Here come the Bulldogs!

Tony Matz took over the coaching duties in 1960 when Shaak took a year off from coaching. Matz continued the program's success as the Bulldogs finished 6-3-1. Matz's first win as coach was against Columbia, 6-0, in a game that was delayed by a thunderstorm.

Shaak returned for his final year in 1961 and led the Bulldogs to a 7-3 finish. The schools' sixth straight winning season.

During his 10 seasons, Shaak went 44-43-5.

Matz again took the head coaching duties and the Bulldogs fell on rough times during 2-15-2 in 1962 and 1963. In 1962, Dale Witwer received the Ron Kichline Award for his performance. In 1963, Gerald Vlasak was the first Wilson player to catch more than 30 passes in a season.

During his three seasons as head coach, Matz was 8-18-3.

The following year would bring a new coach and a rebirth to the Wilson football program. The coach was John Gurski. When Gurski took over in 1964 the coaching staff figured, the Bulldogs would need a miracle to finish 5-5. A miracle did happen.

The Bulldogs did finish 5-5 that season. It was also during that year when the Bulldogs were an underclassmen. He felt that underclassmen needed to learn the system and gain experience before taking over a starting position.

By using a fresh squad on both offense and defense, the Bulldogs were able to wear out their opponents. The Bulldogs finished 8-2-1 that year and Gurski earned his 100th win as Wilson's coach by edging out Hemphill 14-12.

This new strategy started a four-year string beginning in 1978 when the Bulldogs went combined 43-2. The losses came during the 1979 and 1980 seasons. The Bulldogs also won four straight Lancaster-Lebanon League Championships during this time.

In 1978, Wilson was led by quarterback Jim Kirkpatrick who threw nine touchdown passes. The defense was anchored by Big 3 selections, back Randy Simcox and tackle Mike Mohler. Simcox was also an all-state selection for the Bulldogs. This team achieved a 28 point margin of victory average.

The 1979 squad was led by its defense. The Bulldogs gave up only 35 points all season. Nine of those points came against Hemphill in a

Wilson entered a game against league-favorite Lancaster Catholic as a heavy underdog. The Bulldogs, who were coming off a tough, 20-12, loss to Schuylkill Haven, changed its defense for the game and at last the Bulldogs were leading, 14-0. Catholic made some halftime adjustments but the Bulldogs were able to hold on for a 14-13 victory. This game marked the beginning of big things for the Bulldog program.

In 1965, the Bulldogs again finished 5-5. The following season, they tied a school record in wins with eight. Bruce Vaughan became the first Wilson player to win the Ron Kichline Award as the Berks County Lineman of the Year.

In the 1967 season, Wilson began its dominance of Berks County football.

Under the direction of quarterback Glen Hare and the running power of Michael Reitz, the Bulldogs scored 387 points and collected 4,010 yards in total offense en route to the school's first undefeated season. Hare threw 17 touchdown passes and Reitz gained 1,411 total yards.

The 10-0 season was capped off with a 9-0 win against Governor Mifflin and the Bulldogs had their second championship in the school's history.

In 1968, the Bulldogs slipped to 6-4 but greatness was another year away.

After routing Governor Mifflin 32-6 in 1969, Gurski had his second Tri-County championship and second 10-0 season in three years.

On offense, quarterback John Youm led the Bulldogs to 327 points and 309 yards in total offense. The defense was anchored by tackles Gerry Slennier, who would later be head coach, and Rick Fehling. Slennier and Fehling were both selected to the Big 33 Football Classic which is played in Hershey every summer.

In 1970, the Bulldogs would go 8-2.

In 1971, the winning continued with a record of 7-2-1. During that year, Richard Wardrop returned an interception 101 yards against Muhlenberg for a touchdown. This would shatter a 23-year-old record set in 1948 by Moyer.

In 1973, Wilson went 8-2.

The following year Wilson was 6-4 and won its third Tri-County Championship. In 1975, Wilson finished 5-5. The following year things were back on track as Wilson finished 8-3.

In 1977, Gurski devised a strategy that would make Wilson a much better program and get more kids playing time. For years, football teams were using only their best players on both offense and defense.

Gurski based his coaching style on the senior system. He always believed that a senior should have the right to play over an underclassman. He felt that underclassmen needed to learn the system and gain experience before taking over a starting position.

By using a fresh squad on both offense and defense, the Bulldogs were able to wear out their opponents. The Bulldogs finished 8-2-1 that year and Gurski earned his 100th win as Wilson's coach by edging out Hemphill 14-12.

This new strategy started a four-year string beginning in 1978 when the Bulldogs went combined 43-2. The losses came during the 1979 and 1980 seasons. The Bulldogs also won four straight Lancaster-Lebanon League Championships during this time.

beatdown 9-7 loss. Also, Wilson's first John Gurski was selected to the Big 33.

Wilson continued to dominate as they entered the 1980s. The 1980 squad went 10-1 and was led by quarterback Kirk Aurdand who threw eight touchdowns passes. The defense was led by defensive tackle Leroy Schannauer and guard Tony Cianci.

Gurski's dynasty continued in 1981 when he led Wilson to its fourth undefeated season and its fourth straight Lancaster-Lebanon League Championship. Led by Big 33 and all-state selection Schannauer, the Bulldog defense didn't allow a rushing touchdown and only gave up 116.8 yards per game in total offense.

The return of John Gurski ended in 1982 when the Bulldogs finished 7-3-1. During his 18 seasons as head coach, he won 151 games, scored seven championships and had four undefeated seasons. The only question remains is who will replace Gurski.

It was now time for Gerry Slennier.

During Slennier's first two seasons (1983 and 1984), the Bulldogs finished 6-4 and 7-4 respectively. His first win was a 51-0 rout of Exeter.

Things started to improve for Slennier in 1985, when he led the Bulldogs to an 8-3 mark and the team's first Lancaster-Lebanon League Championship since 1981. Quarterback Eric Deck and running back Jim Lewis led a Wilson attack that averaged more than 20 points per game. Seppi Winkler and end Mike Rosol, Wilson averaged more than 20 points per game.

In 1986, the Bulldogs finished 6-5. In 1987, Slennier earned his second championship, when the Bulldogs finished 8-3. Led by quarterback Seppi Winkler and end Mike Rosol, Wilson averaged more than 20 points per game.

In 1988, Wilson finished 7-3.

Led by all-state quarterback Kerry Collins and all-state running back Brian McCarty, the 1989 Wilson football squad won more games than any other team in history. Collins would finish his career with 2,727 yards passing and 220 touchdowns while McCarty would finish with 184 points and 2,841 yards of total offense.

After going 10-0 during the regular season, which included a miracle comeback against Lancaster McCaskey, 14-13 the Bulldogs won their first District III AAA Championship by defeating Cedar Cliff, 17-7. After defeating Coatsville, 32-20, in the state semifinals, the Bulldogs squared off against Upper St. Clair for the championship. After opening an early lead, St. Clair scored a late touchdown to win the championship 12-7.

The 1990 squad tried to keep the momentum of the previous year alive. The Bulldogs went 12-2 and won its second straight PIAA District III AAA Championship.

Chris Adams and Jeff Niedrowski led a Wilson attack that averaged more than 30 points and 325 total yards per game. Niedrowski completed his career as the all-time leader in rushing with 2,524 yards.

The miracle of this season came during the District Championship game when Adams hit Dean Kruse in the back of the end zone with no time remaining to defeat Cumberland Valley, 34-32. The luck would run out the following week when Wilson would lose to Ridley, 14-12, in the PIAA Eastern semifinals.

In 1991, the Bulldogs finished 7-4. The championships would come rolling back as Wilson won back-to-back Lancaster-Lebanon League Championships under the direction of quarterback Shane Stafford in 1992 and 1993. The team finished 9-3 in '92 and 8-3 in '93. Stafford would finish his career as the all-time leading passer with 28 touchdowns and 2,870 yards.

During his 11 years as coach, Slennier went 92-35-0 and won seven championships.

May the tradition continue...

Wilson High School football team has a place in history. During the first 50 years, 35 teams have produced winning records and 13 have won state championships. Though, nine teams have won the Tri-County League Championship and rank among Wilson's best.

1959
Coach Bob Shaak's 1959 squad was the only President team to win eight games. The team completed the season as runner-up to Governor Mifflin - its only loss to the Tri-County League Championship.

The Presidents scored 233 points and rushed for 2,246 yards, including 409 against Daniel Boone. The offense was led by quarterback Andy Straka, who threw seven touchdown passes. Other key scorers were Al Schwerdt, Greg Allushuski, Bob Kopp, Dave Berger, Ron Chelusa, and Ed Bauer.

The defense, which allowed 52 points and shutout six of its 10 opponents, was anchored by two-time All-Berks County center Kit Fegley. Kit Fegley completed his career with 160 tackles. Other key defenders were Ed Bauer, Ron Chelusa, Caesar Buzanica, Jim Moyer, Bill Koch, Fred Schmitt, Jim Miller, Andy Straka, Al Schwerdt, and Greg Allushuski.

This season ended the Presidents run because beginning with the 1960 football season, Wilson athletic teams were nicknamed the Bulldogs rather than the Presidents.

1967
Wilson's first undefeated team and the first Berks County team ever to win 10 games in a season. The 9-0 victory over Governor Mifflin gave Wilson its first Tri-County Conference Championship and its first win over the arch-rival Mustangs in 13 seasons.

The Bulldogs scored a record 387 points and averaged 40.1 yards per game. Back Mike Reitz broke the Berks County scoring record by scoring 40 points. Including 32 against Wilson Borough and finished his career with 254 points. Quarterback Glenn Hare threw 17 touchdown passes and completed his career with 25 touchdown passes. End Ron Allushuski caught six touchdowns.

Against Muhlenberg in a game played at Reading Municipal Stadium before the largest crowd ever to watch a Wilson football game, Mike Reitz gave a big performance by rushing for a Bulldog record 256 yards and scoring 22 points behind the outstanding blocking of fullback Bill Haas.

Reitz gained 1,411 total yards and finished his career with 2,493 total yards. He became Wilson's first player to be selected to play in the "Big 33" game. Back Scott Campani finished his career with 1,957 total yards gained to rank No. 2 on the all-time Wilson list.

The defense allowed 92 points and was led by Steve Kramer, Reitz, Campani, Pete Stover, Mike Gymbor, Mike Hower, Greg Raffauf, Ross Hower, Mike Hettinger, Richard Auman, and Scott Shoup.

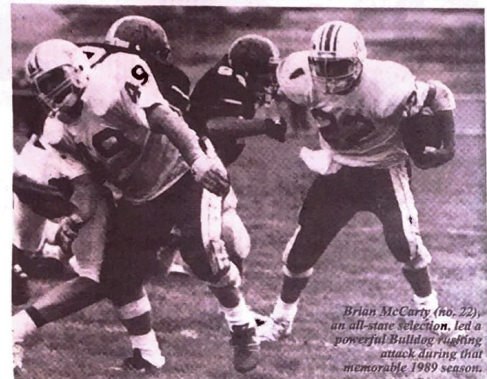
1968
The 1968 team was Gurski's second undefeated Bulldog team and completed the season with a 12-4 victory over Governor Mifflin for the Tri-County Conference Championship and a 10-0 record. The team scored 327 points and averaged 30.9 yards per game behind quarterback John Yocum. Scott Simpson caught six touchdown passes.

The key running backs were Craig Reitz, Barry Hess, and Dennis Riegel.

The defense allowed 99 points and featured two outstanding two-way linemen in tackle Gerry Slennmer and end Rick Fehling, both were selected to play in the "Big 33" game. Other key linemen were Harold Slennmer, Joe Federowicz, Gary Lempel, Frank Pouppore, and Steve Gass. Providing help in the defensive backfield were Tom Chrich and Terry Wickman.

1978
The 1978 team was Gurski's third undefeated Bulldog team and the first to win 11 games. On

offense, the team averaged 331 yards per game and quarterback Jim Kirschenrich completed 51% of his passes for nine touchdowns. Dean Shollenberger and Mark Cornfield were the leading receivers while the rushing and scoring leaders were Carl Ohlinger, Randy Simcox, Brent Grace and Joe Pullano for the first Wilson team to win a Lancaster-Lebanon League-Section One Championship. The offensive line included Dave Guiles, Pat Berg, Jeff Omlor, Dave Ritter, Bob Engle, and Dan Wentzel.

The defense set the Wilson record for least yards allowed rushing and passing in a season - an average of 123.6 yards. The defense was led by "Big 33" game selections back Randy Simcox and tackle Mike Mohler. Other key defenders of this team which allowed 46 points to be scored and shutout four opponents were Tom Hoy, Kevin Seibert, Paul Tietbohl, Bryan Romig, Burnell Clemmer, Blair Weaver, Scott Lee, and Kevin Imbody. Simcox intercepted three passes to finish his career with 13 and was named first-team All-State as a defensive back. Other defensive backs were John Dutweiler and Dave Moyer.

1978
Gurski's 1978 team won Wilson's second Lancaster-Lebanon League Championship with a 10 - 1 record. The loss was a 9-7 defeat at Hempfield, which ended the Bulldogs 22-game winning streak.

The offense was led by the running and scoring of Vito Ninfo who gained 1,234 yards and scored 102 points behind the outstanding blocking of tackle John Gurski, who was selected to play in the "Big 33" game. Quarterback Jim Kirschenrich threw five touchdown passes and finished his career with 14 touchdown passes and 1,619 passing yards. Other offensive linemen were Brad Ross, Mark Buchholz, Tim Talarico, and Chris Koss.

The defense allowed 35 points and shutout six opponents, both Bulldog records. It was led by returning starters Bryan Romig, Burnell Clemmer, Phil Tietbohl, and Kevin Imbody. Other key defenders were Matt Barto, Paul Covell, Walter Kidd, Leroy Schannauer, Dean Shollenberger, Bill Amadio, and Bruce Keller.

1980
The 1980 team won the third consecutive Lancaster-Lebanon League-Section Title with an 11 - 1 record. Quarterback Kirk Aumoff completed 50% of his passes for eight touchdowns. Don Hivner and Phil Rowe were the leading receivers. Vito Ninfo, Pete Schreck, and Doug Ertz were the leading rushers and scorers for an offense which scored 309 points and averaged 316.3 yards per game running behind an offensive line of Neil Harold, Brad Hain, Matt Tomaszewski, Gary Moyer, Chris Coleman, and Scott McNerry.

The defense, which allowed 155.8 yards per game and allowed 83 points to score was led by Patrick Szustak, Leroy Schannauer, Tony Clanci, Pete Schreck, Chris Conner, Matt Barto, Paul Covell, and Dan Hivner.

1981
The 1981 team was Gurski's fourth undefeated Bulldog team and also won Wilson's fourth consecutive Lancaster-Lebanon League Championship with an 11 - 0 record. The offense was led by backs Pete Schreck, Leroy Schannauer, Kurt Bosh, and Gary Mitzel; quarterback Scott Shoenert; ends Ken Auman and Ray Kische, plus offensive linemen Neil Howard, Tom Schatzman, Todd Seaman, Ken Ritter, Matt Schucker, and James Ebert.

The 1981 team was an outstanding defensive team led by first team All-State selection and "Big 33" player tackle Leroy Schannauer. Wilson defensive records include least yards allowed rushing in a season (49 yards per game), least yards allowed rushing and passing in a season (116.8 yard average), least yards allowed per rushing play (1.6 yard average), and no touchdowns allowed rushing for the season. Other key defenders were Tony Clanci, Scott Bousler, Ernest Wilber, Andy Ziolkowski, Pete Kaske, Pete Schreck, Kevin Close, Kevin Vantine, Bryan Grace, and Tony Luchese.

1989
The 1989 team won the most games in the history of Wilson football and advanced to play for the PIAA AAAAA state championship at Hershey. Coach Gerry Slennmer's Bulldogs finished the

season with a record of 14 - 1 including championships of Lancaster-Lebanon League, PIAA District 3, the Great Eight Region, PIAA Eastern Pennsylvania, plus, completing an undefeated regular season.

Quarterback Kerry Collins, back Brian McCarty, and end Todd Bradburn were the leaders of the offense and the accomplishments of this trio during this season rank as the best in Bulldog football history. Kerry Collins and Brian McCarty were named first team All-State players.

Also, quarterback Kerry Collins who threw 17 touchdown passes for 2,043 yards during the season, was selected to play in the "Big 33" game.

This season had many memorable moments. Collins hit Bradburn on a 79-yard touchdown play which guided the Bulldogs to a 14-13 win over Lancaster McCaskey.

Wilson's first PIAA District 3 Championship is a 17-7 victory over defending Champion Cedar Cliff at Hershey. "USA Today" National High School Player of the Year, end Kyle Brady of Cedar Cliff, does not catch a pass against the defense led by Marty Palm, Brandon Naples, Brian McCarty, Jack Ledbetter, Jake Slennmer, Josh Erb, Mark Bingham, Derrick Wensch, Jamie Shoemfelt, Kevin Angstadt, and Jeff Montgomery.

In a game for the Eastern Pennsylvania PIAA AAAAA Championship played at Millersville, the Bulldogs came from behind for a 32-20 victory over Coatesville.

Brian McCarty scored two touchdowns running behind the offensive line of Bill Panos, Chris Bender, Ted Koch, Kraig Hume, and Rob Burkhardt. However, the turning point of the game occurred when Jack Ledbetter caused a fumble on an attempted Coatesville punt and Mark Bingham recovered the fumble and ran 14 yards for the go ahead score. This victory gave the Bulldogs their first chance at a state championship in football. One week later on a very cold December evening in Hershey, Wilson lost 12-7 to Upper St. Clair.

The 1989 season will long be remembered as the most rewarding in Bulldog football history.

1990
Coach Gerry Slennmer's 1990 team completed the season with a 12-2 record and the PIAA District 3 and The Great Eight Region championships. The offense which averaged 30.7 points per game and 325 yards per game was led by back Jeff Niedrowski who gained 1,274 yards and scored 107 points behind an offensive line of Mike Eisenhower, Ken Buczynski, Chris Bender, Joe Lenart, and Matt Lucas. Back Greg Glembocki averaged a Wilson record eight yards per carry. Jeff Slennmer blocked a fumble.

Quarterback Chris Adams completed 55% of his passes (another record) for 1,695 yards and 12 touchdowns. Dean Karas caught 31 passes for 588 yards and five touchdowns. Shane Hare caught 26 passes for 358 yards and three touchdowns.

During the regular season the Bulldogs lost to Lancaster McCaskey, 16-14, which cost Wilson the Lancaster-Lebanon League championship. However, in the PIAA District 3 playoff game played at Millersville the Bulldogs recorded a 27-0 victory over McCaskey. This game featured a 16 tackle performance by Jake Slennmer, the Bulldogs first team All-State linebacker. Other key defenders were Jack Ledbetter, Jamie Shoemfelt and Chris Myers. The victory set up a PIAA District 3 championship game against favored and Wilson nemesis Cumberland Valley.

Wilson won its second consecutive PIAA District 3 Championship with a thrilling 34-32 victory over Cumberland Valley at Hershey. Chris Adams hit Dean Karas in the back of the end zone with no time remaining to win the game. Adams led the Bulldogs on that 82-yard winning drive with less than two minutes to play.

One week later, in a game played at Lehigh University for the PIAA Eastern Pennsylvania championship, the Bulldogs lost 14-12 to Rudley.

The Wilson Century Club was organized in January 1977, with the purpose to honor Wilson football players who scored 100 or more points in their career.

The idea for this organization was nurtured during the 1976 football season when a group of Wilson Boosters sought ways to recognize Rick Stehman for his accomplishments during the 1976 season. Stehman had scored 105 points during his career, from which the name Wilson Century Club was proposed and adopted.

In addition to Rick Stehman, the charter members of the club include Bob Mitzel (1951), Carl Beidler (1957), Scott Campani (1967), Mike Reitz (1967), John Yocum (1969), Barry Ross (1970), and Rick Wardrop (1971), plus John Gurski, who qualified for membership on the basis of having 100 wins as a head coach.

The first annual dinner meeting of the Wilson Century Club was held at the Spring House and Rick Stehman was presented with a plaque and a bond which are given to all new members upon their induction into the club at the annual dinner meeting.

Since the inception of the Century Club, other players who qualified for membership by virtue of scoring 100 or more points in their career include Randy Simcox (1978), Carl Ohlinger (1978), Vito Ninfo (1980), Doug Ertz (1980), Pete Schreck (1981), Brad Ramsey (1983), Jim Lewis (1985), Brian McCarty (1989), Jeff Niedrowski (1991), Josh Danner (1993), and Dustin Sands (1993).

In 1988 membership expanded to include offensive linemen who made All-State or were selected to the "Big 33" Team; offensive ends with 500 yards pass receiving or 50 receptions in a career; quarterbacks with 25 touchdowns passes or 1,500 or more yards in passing yardage during their career; and coaches with 100 wins at Wilson.

dedication, loyalty and love for the game of football.

That is what Warren Eberly, Robert Thompson, Robert Shaak, Tony Matz, John Gurski, Gerry Slemmer have in common.

They are the men who have guided the Wilson High School football program from its infancy to one of the most respected programs in the state.

Going into the 1994 season - the 50th in the school's history, the group of head coaches have combined for a 309-173-14 record, 13 league championships, four undefeated seasons and 35 winning seasons.

Eberly was the first to be named head coach during that first season in 1945.

Eberly was a 1936 Wilson graduate and stand-out football player at Muhlenberg College in Allentown.

However, his college experience did not prepare him for that first season - not with a \$6,200 budget to buy equipment and supplies, all games scheduled for on the road and 54 inexperienced players.

The Presidents as they were then known finished this year 1-4 and scored only 26 points all season.

The first and only win was an opening day victory over Reading High School's junior varsity, 7-0, at George Field.

The school's first touchdown was a 31-yard pass play from running back Jim Lippincott to Robert Wedder.

Eberly left the Wilson program a year later to take a job with the Muhlenberg Township School District. He continued to stay involved in athletics as a football official.

He even was an official for Wilson games. He donated his pay to the school's athletic fund.

Thompson took over in 1946 and led Wilson to its first winning season - 4-3-1. However, tragedy struck followed and his last season in 1950 left him with a 13-29-2 mark. In 1950, he led Wilson to its first Berks County Championship.

Shaak, a native of Lebanon and star at Lebanon Valley College, Annuville, also found the road paved with potholes in 1951.

"It was extremely tough in the beginning," recalls Shaak, who was only 23 when he was hired. "In 1951, the equipment was second hand. There was no money from the school and a large crowd was 800 people."

"We would play tougher and bigger opponents if we knew we were guaranteed gate receipts. Since we were a small school at that time, it was very tough to get kids."

This was evident when the Presidents traveled to Lebanon to play the Cedars in 1952. Wilson had 14 players, Lebanon 37.

One of the Lebanon players was all-state running back George Marinkov. He led the Cedars to a 69-7 win.

"When we got back to town, I marched right into Ralph (Leininger) office and demanded that next year's contract be cancelled or I'm quitting," said Shaak.

Fortunately, Shaak didn't quit.

A club was established in 1953 and the club raised \$2,000 so the team could purchase new equipment. That year, the team finished 4-1-1.

It was in 1956 when the Presidents topped .500 again at 6-3.

The 1957 and 1958 seasons were also winning ones and then in 1959 they finished 8-1-1.

The lone loss was to cross-country rival Governor Mifflin.

In 1960, the school nickname was changed to the Bulldogs and Matz was named

head coach.

Matz assumed the position when Shaak took a sabbatical leave. Matz continued the success of Shaak and led the Bulldogs to a 6-3-1 finish.

Shaak returned the following year for his final season and the Bulldogs finished 7-3. In 10 seasons, Shaak compiled 44-43-5 record.

Matz was back on the helm for the 1962 and 1963 seasons as the Bulldogs went 2-15-2.

"I was the individual who brought the great John Gurski to Wilson," laughed Matz, reflecting on his last two years as coach.

"When John arrived (1964), I stayed on as an assistant and we examined the team we had coming back," recalled Matz. "At best, we would need a miracle to finish 5-5."

Miracles can happen and one did.

The Bulldogs finished 5-5 in Gurski's first season, a thrilling 14-13 win over Lancaster Catholic, the first major building block to what would become a tower of excellence.

"We entered a game against Lancaster Catholic, who was the Tri-County favorite, as a heavy underdog," said Gurski. "We used a defense called the split and gap, and at half we were leading 14-0."

"Catholic decided to throw the ball in the second half and we held on for a 14-13 victory. I will never forget the reaction of our kids when they got on the

bus. They couldn't believe we won the ballgame. This was the game that turned our entire program around.

"I was often criticized for having long practices, especially when we needed car lights to see," said Gurski. "But if this program was going to be successful we needed to be dedicated."

"Since we were very small, I established a weight training program and I made sure that we always scrimmaged."

Conditioning was a top priority as was a solid defense and a running game. The combination would become the Bulldog benchmark.

"Defense and a solid running attack were the key to any ballclub," said Gurski. "If you were able to keep your opponent's offense off the field, you were almost guaranteed a victory."

Gurski's first winning season as coach was in 1966 when the Bulldogs tied a school record with eight wins. That record was equaled the following year as the Bulldogs went 10-0, the school's first undefeated season, and won the Tri-County League championship.

"The cooperation from the school was very important in the development of this program," said Gurski. "When I first came here I was able to get the best equipment and the administration did whatever they could to help."

Gurski remained at the helm of the Wilson program until 1982. During his 19 seasons, he won 151 games, had four undefeated seasons, three Tri-County League championships and four Lancaster-Lebanon League Section One championships.

"Winning builds tradition," said Gurski. "No

one wants to lose."

Following Gurski's tenure was an awesome task. It was Gerry Slemmer who was summoned to keep the "tradition" alive.

During the first two seasons, the Bulldogs finished 6-4 and 7-4 - respectively for most programs but not Wilson.

"I was the new kid on the block," said Slemmer. "There are at least five games where bad coaching decisions cost us a victory."

"I was pressing a little bit, but during those first two seasons I never made the same mistake twice. It was a definite learning experience."

Slemmer was also learning from coaches that had sided with Gurski during his tenure.

"Bernie Stoppi and Bill Morgan were the most that kept the program together," said Slemmer. "Each year, I could see improvement as we worked to keep the Wilson football tradition strong."

Slemmer's hard work paid off as he led the Bulldogs to the Lancaster-Lebanon League title in 1985. Four years later, the program reached new heights as it finished 14-1, which included a difficult loss to Upper St. Clair in the PIAA State Championship game, 12-7.

"The district and state playoffs added a lot to the tradition of this program," said Slemmer. "It was the best thing that could happen to Wilson since it gave us recognition on the district and state level."

Through the 1993 season, Slemmer has 92 wins, two district championships and five Lancaster-Lebanon League Championships.

For Wilson, the tradition continues.

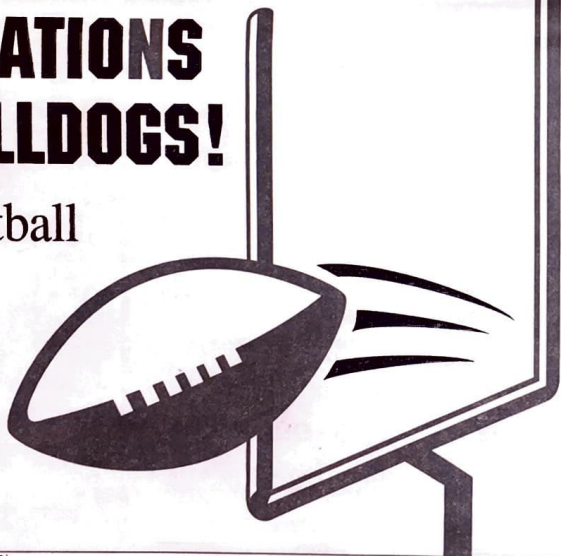

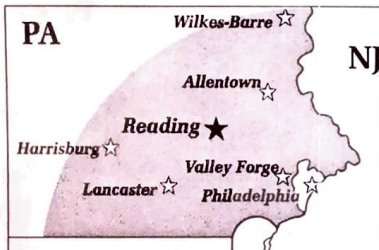

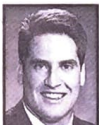
